# CAPTAINS REPORT

The Senior Golfers' Society of Australia 2013 tour of the United Kingdom was an outstanding success from every point of view. Meticulous pre-planning by our UK hosts and concurrent preparation in Australia ensured a virtually trouble-free tour. The touring team played on some of the finest courses in Scotland and England, if not the world, and enjoyed hospitality that was warm and generous in the extreme. Even the weather generally held good for the whole trip.

Of particular note was the way in which our ladies were included. Whether playing, being entertained or on the very well conducted tours of historic sites, they were made to feel most welcome and the esprit within the touring party was very much enhanced accordingly.

Whilst we won just one more competition than the total of our losses and draws, which was a pleasing result, the overriding feeling within the team was one of a sense of privilege in being members of such a happy and well organized group, playing on magnificent courses, hosted by generous and convivial UK club members, whilst absorbing the beauty of the English countryside and the sense of history spanning many centuries.

That this all came together so well did not occur by accident. The initial tour planning by the UK Senior Golfers Society was quite superb in all aspects of course/club selection and access, excellent accommodation, very good bus coaches and drivers and interesting tours arranged for our non-golfing ladies. Early liaison with the Senior Golfers Society of Australia through John Marcard to firstly establish a team (with partners) proved sensible. As Team Captain it was pleasing to see how all members approached accepted individual tour responsibilities.

Don McNee as Treasurer supported by Peter Motteram (also Flagmaster) was a key appointment. Barry Barr as Match Master balanced the handicaps superbly and with John Webb recorded the daily match results.

The Baggage Masters in Peter Davies (also Vice Captain) and Roger Wilson did a magnificent job in codifying our luggage and ensuring that nothing was misplaced or lost throughout the tour. A daunting task and well done to both.

Chris Whitford provided the essential tour photographer's record; a big job and well done.

The Ladies Captain Prue Webb fulfilled her role magnificently with charm and enthusiasm that was greatly appreciated by the lady golfers.

Jenny Slade, in co-operation with UK SGS, did a great deal in the lead-up to the tour to plan a very interesting and comprehensive program for the non-golfing ladies and did a brilliant job co-coordinating the visits. A good Scribe to put the Report together is essential and Peter Robbie has done us all proud in that respect. With 15 courses played in just 22 days, it was important to compile notes of the tour on a daily basis.

Another innovation was to appoint a daily Match Captain to brief the team on the evening before of the following day's game, to liaise with the host club's match captain and to do a 'thank you' speech after lunch or dinner. This took a big load off me as Tour Captain.

Finally, Marlena in putting together a brochure including all details of matches, job responsibilities, general information, accommodation arrangements and the CV's of couples which was issued before we departed Australia, did a fantastic and essential job. A copy of the brochure is attached to this Report for the information of future teams.

In respect to suggestions for improvement, there were very few. One member thought that there was not quite enough rest time between games but others were happy with the scheduling. Another member would have liked to have one day for husbands and wives/ partners to play together, perhaps on a scheduled rest day.

In summary, this was a wonderfully planned and executed tour, greatly enjoyed by us all. Words can't express the gratitude that we feel to our wonderful hosts for all they did to make our tour so memorable in every respect.

Of particular note was the effort put in by David Baxter and his wife Debra. David spent months of carefully considered planning and liaison with team members in Australia leading up to the tour with nothing left to chance. He and Debra 'chaperoned' us magnificently for much of the tour as the UK Seniors Golfers' Society's representatives.

It would be remiss not to mention the exceptional hospitality extended to the team by His Excellency, the Australian High Commissioner, Mr Mike Rann and his staff. The High Commissioner treated us to a full tour of Australia House, from the rooftop to the basement, and followed a delicious and generous morning tea with a detailed briefing of his High Commissioner's role.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my team members, their spouses and partners for their friendship, cooperation and willingness to share the duties.

# TOUR PLANNING

An invitation from the United Kingdom Seniors Golf Society was received in November 2011, for 16 couples to tour in 2013.

The invitation was formally accepted at the Annual Meeting of the Society in April 2012 and this meeting laid down the formula for selecting the participants from our constituent societies roughly in proportion to their respective memberships.

The final team comprised four players from New South Wales, three each from Queensland, Victoria and Western Australia, two from South Australia and the ACT's Michael Jeffery who accepted the office of Tour Captain.

The onerous task of communicating with participants, of receiving and remitting deposit and other funds, arranging team shirts, balls and sundry enquiries from our tourists was assigned to John Marcard. From among the tourists, volunteers were called to and assigned to perform various roles;

The SGS has a large annual fixture list, some 130 matches and enjoys good relationships built up over the years with many golf clubs throughout the UK. The SGS committee devised the itinerary for the tour and committee members were asked to take responsibility for negotiating the dates and format of golf at the selected clubs in each geographical area.

There was a desire to include as many of the best venues as possible in the itinerary, which resulted in a preponderance of links courses. In Scotland, since the Open was to be at Muirfield in 2013, it was decided to arrange fix- tures in the West;

- Prestwick has the largest number of SGS members in the area and was the obvious choice for the opening match.
- Southerness hosts an annual two day match with SGS.
- In the North West the course selection was the same as for the annual tour enjoyed by SGS members in September each year.
- In the South West the three courses selected are again very SGS friendly with many of the SW Seniors being members of these clubs.
- The same applies in the South East, with the choice of Woking as the final venue being an obvious one, since this is the SGS 'home Club'.





David and Deborah Baxter first became involved in the tour arrangements after the itinerary had been agreed with David Baxter and John Marcard liaising to resolve the detailed planning.

Over the months proceeding the tour the email traffic increased to the point of overload as the volunteer team contributed details and sought consensus on the huge variety of planning issues. Gradually the itinerary was fleshed out with tee times, playing partners, dining, entertainment and excursion arrangements. David Baxter's attention to detail was extraordinary and later in the tour as the full benefit of the effort applied to planning became evident, David earned the moniker "Rolex" with several tourists forming a view the efficiency of the planning and precision of execution could have only been achieved with the experience of a Swiss watch logistics expert.

Everyone in the touring party travelled independently and choose to holiday in different parts of the world on route to Glasgow to be there on the 10th of June. With seemingly effortless precision everyone arrived in good health and in great expectation.

## TROON

Because the touring party was drawn from the different states of Australia only a few of the couples were known to each other. The stylish "Old Marine Hotel" at Troon was the scene for introductions but the lead up to the tour meant our hosts could easily be forgiven for thinking we were all a group of old friends by the time a lone piper called us to cocktails and a formal welcome and the commencement of the tour.

It was appreciated that so many of the SGS office bearers had travelled from throughout England and Scotland to make us welcome and to play in our opening Prestwick match. It was also wonderful that local members had invited us to split into smaller groups and arrange private dinner parties at their homes for the following evening so the Troon welcome was an opportunity to get to know the locals and experience splendid Scottish hospitality.

## WESTERN GAILES

Together with the line of dunes running down the coastal stretch from the 5th to the 13th holes, the out of bounds wall from the 14th onwards, the plentiful supply of pot bunkers plus the meandering burns, all combine to present variety and a memorable challenge.

In the Clubhouse lounge of Western Gailes in pride of place sits a solid silver kangaroo donated to the club in 1928 by the Gailes Golf Club of Brisbane.

Thinking this would make a great photo to send home, Sandy Ferguson of Western Gailes invited an unsuspecting tourist to pose with the trophy.

A small sign saying DO NOT TOUCH -ALARMED too late became apparent, the kangaroo hastily replaced. and security incident narrowly averted.

Southerness proved to be a challenging but fair test of golf, with no blind shots or dunes to negotiate. Good shots were rewarded, but the strategically placed heather kept everyone honest. As we bid our farewells to our hosts for their generous hospitality, we thanked the golfing gods for keeping the rain away and making our visit to Southerness a truly memorable experience.

The match went down to the wire and with all but one group in the Clubhouse the tourists were one match down. On the eighteenth tee the last group were all square.
